10:50 – 12:00 SESSION 2 – Necessary Enabling Frameworks for Successful PPPs

The legal framework, institutional capacity and public policy are critical elements if PPPs are to be a success. Infrastructure projects tend to be large, expensive and have a long term impact. This means there are a large number of stakeholders that have strong interests in the project and can potentially undermine a project as it goes through the various stages. Countries need a clear, predictable and legitimate institutional framework, competent procuring authorities, good regulation, and honest interaction with the private sector and trusted consultation with stakeholders. Issues to be discussed in this session include:

- What is the necessary institutional capacity to create, manage, and evaluate PPPs?
- What are the main dangers to projects and how can they be mitigated?

The study visits will be made to Gu'an Economic Development Zone in Hubei and a PPP demonstration project on environmental wastewater management in Tongzhou district. The visit to each place will compose of 1 hour visiting the project sites and a special workshop for 1.5 hour where we will have a presentation and Q&A hosted by the organizing office.

09:30 - 12:00	Gu'an Economic Development Zone (Hebei Province, Langfang)

Gu'an New Industrial City is located 50 kilometers south of the Tiananmen Square in Beijing, in the heart of the greater Beijing. More than ten years ago, Gu'an was a typical agricultural county, where fishing tackles, casings, cartridges and plastic were the four mainstays supporting the County's industry. On June 28, 2002, the foundation of the Gu'an Industrial Park was laid, and a prelude to rapid development of Gu'an was commenced. Inviting global wisdom from more than 40 masters in urban strategy, industry research and spatial planning from nine countries and regions led to combine international success experience with the actual situation of the region to outline the future development prospect of the Park, and it now the characteristic of the parks in Gu'an now includes Gu'an Aerospace Industrial Park, Gu'an Satellite Navigation Industrial Park, Gu'an Peptide Valley Biomedical Industrial Park, Gu'an E-commerce Industrial Park, and Gu'an New Material Industrial Park.

15:00 – 17:30 Clean Water PPP Demonstration Project in Tongzhou District (Beijing)

The project of water environment comprehensive improvement of Tonghui River (Tongzhou section) is an important component of core area construction of Tongzhou new city and one of the vital factors of promoting other projects including cross-river bridge, cross-river tunnel, metro line M6, reconstruction of Xihaizi Park and waterfront area along the Grand Canal. The current cement-made revetment wall on both sides of Tonghui River could not meet the public's need for waterfront leisure due to its low water level and deep river channel. Thus the river control project took place to broaden the width of the river, ease the slope protection on both sides, and enhance the green landscape in order to build a waterfront green belt along the river. In addition, given Tonghui River is the municipal drainage river, Tongzhou District built a water purification wetland to provide water source for the waterfront area and Xihaizi Park as well as improve the quality of the river through the wetland purification system and water circulation. The first-stage project of water environment comprehensive improvement of Tonghui River covers Baliqiao (within Tongzhou District) to Wohuqiao(flow into the river mouth of North Canal), a total length of about 4.3km, of which the core area section is 1.2km long.

Ian Hawkesworth

Head of Public-Private Partnerships and Capital Budgeting, Public Governance and Territorial Development Directorate, OECD

Ian Hawkesworth is Head of Public-Private Partnerships and Capital Budgeting in the Public Governance Directorate at the OECD. In this capacity he manages the Network of Senior Infrastructure and PPP Officials and its associated work program. He is responsible for comparative studies, country reviews, and government advisory services. He is currently finalizing reviews of the UK and the Philippines, managing the OECD-AFDB project on PPP framework strengthening in Tunisia and contributes to the G20 Working Party on Infrastructure under the Turkish 2015 Chairmanship. His paper 'Towards a framework for the Governance of Infrastructure' was welcomed by G20 Finance Ministers in November 2015. Ian led the work that culminated in the 2012 OECD Recommendation for Public Governance of Public-Private Partnerships that brings together the collective best practices for how the public sector should manage PPPs. This now forms part of OECD 'soft law'. Ian also works on public finance issues, particularly with respect to fiscal risks, and has led a number of country reviews of Russia, Poland, Bulgaria, Greece, Australia and Indonesia. Before joining the OECD Ian was Head of Section in the Budget Department of the Ministry of Finance in Denmark. He led the implementation of accrual budgeting and oversaw the budgets of the Ministry for Agriculture and the Ministry for Industry, Commerce and Housing. He has MA from the London School of Economics (UK) and the University of Copenhagen (Denmark) and was associate professor at the latter for a number of years.

Xie Fei is Head of Information Management in the PPP Center of the Ministry of Finance. In this capacity he is responsible for the platform system of integrated information in the PPP Center, exploitation and construction of PPP project library, and he is also in charge of collecting and selecting PPP enquiry agencies in China and editing the draft of selecting regulatory framework. He is currently responsible for management of website of the PPP Center (http://www.cpppc.org) and Wechat public account number 'Dao PPP', the technical supporting for the Ministry about Global Infrastructure Facility. Frédéric Bobay is Project Manager in FIN INFRA, the French Infrastructure Finance & PPPs Unit, at the Directorate-General of the Treasury in the Economic and Finances Ministry in Paris. He manages reviews of PPP assessments for infrastructure projects in France. He is responsible for international cooperation on PPP and infrastructure finance and is in charge of following PPP and infrastructure issues in several international institutions (OECD, G20, UNECE, EU...). Before joining FIN INFRA Frédéric held several positions at the French Treasury, in charge of: official development assistance ex post evaluation; public finances especially performance-based budgeting; European Union Affaires, including as French delegate to a Working Group of the Economic Policy Committee of the Economic and Financial Affairs Council. He previously had some experience in international institutions. He has a master from La Sorbonne University and was a lecturer at the *French Institut d'Etudes Politiques* in Paris.



Bekhbat Sodnom

Executive Director of Mongolian PPP Development Center Board Member of Ulaanbaatar City Development Corporation, Mongolia

Bekhbat Sodnom is Executive Director of Mongolian PPP Development Center. He serves as Board Member of a newly established Ulaanbaatar City Development Corporation, an investment arm, which aims to assess and implement PPP's and private sector initiated investment projects. Prior to his current responsibilities, he served as expert in the Aid Coordination Unit under the Prime Minister's Office and as advisor to Parliamentary standing committee, Minister of Construction and Urban Development, and to Minister of Health. He was a lead consultant on private sector participation in power sector, and in establishment of Health promotion foundation in Mongolia. He was advisor to Parliamentary Ad hoc committee on PPP when he and his colleagues drafted the State Policy on PPP's and the Law on Concession, which were later adopted by Parliament in 2009 and 2010 respectively. From 2012 until 2014, he was DG of Innovation and PPP department of Ministry of Economic development. He provided consulting services to ADB, WB, EBRD, WHO, UNDP and others. He conducted ADB's Mongolia Country Assistance Program Evaluation, the first country assessment of private sector development and governance. He was appointed as first Honorary consul of the Philippines to Mongolia. He has BA degree in Finance and Credit from Russian Plekhanov Academy of National Economy and MA in International Development Policy from Duke University in North Carolina, USA.

Fuguo Cao is Professor of Law at Law School of Central University of Finance and Economics and directs the China Institute of Public Procurement Studies. He is the Director of the recently awarded Legislative Research Program on PPP by the National Planning Office for Social Science and sits on the Review Panel for national PPP model projects by Ministry of Finance. He was a Visiting Scholar to Nottingham University Law School and Fulbright Visiting Scholar at George Washington University Law School. He served the Working Group and Expert Group preparing China's Bidding Law, and Government Procurement Law and Regulations on Concession in Infrastructure Sector. He is currently serving the UNCITRAL Expert Group on PPP law reform. He edits China Public Procurement Law Review and sits on the Editorial Boards of Journal of Chinese Government Procurement (China based), Public Procurement Law Review (European based), Journal of Government Procurement (USA based), International Journal of Public Sector Management (UK based), and Journal of Malaysian and Comparative Law (since 2013).

Camila Vammalle is an economist/policy analyst at the Budgeting and Public Expenditures division, BUD (Public Governance and Territorial Development directorate). This includes PPPAC appraisal of PPP projects of the Central line ministries for approval of the Cabinet Committees, implementation of the Government of India's financial support schemes like Viability Gap Funding, supporting transaction advisory and project development activities through the India Infrastructure Development Fund (IIPDF), facilitating and implementing Technical Assistance Programmes from bilateral and multilateral agencies and PPP Capacity Building programmes. In charge of the DEA's PPP pilot project initiative, whereby projects in challenging sectors are structured and upscaled by developing model documents and schemes and a programmatic approach to project development is promoted, she has successfully developed frameworks for PPPs in Health, Education, Cold Chain Infrastructure, Solid Waste Management with Waste to Energy, and Rural development Sector, Municipal Bond Financing for Urban Local Bodies and ToolKits for Post Award Contract Management. Also handling dedicated and knowledge exchange initiatives on PPP best practices with foreign governments, she has been conducting knowledge exchange programmes for government officials from Asian and African countries, sharing India's PPP experience and international best practices. As an officer of the Indian Revenue Service, she has also held several key assignments in the tax assessment and enforcement wings of the Central Board of Excise and Customs of India in the course of her career. She holds a Master's Degree in Economics.
